18th Annual EURO Auto Festival

The Zentrum was packed once again, the event keeps growing. The 18th Annual EURO Auto Festival was held the weekend of through the show, Youth Judges learned.

The 18th Annual EURO Auto Festival was held the weekend of October 18 - 19 in the Greenville area of South Carolina. The event covers the entire weekend with two rallies through the surrounding area on Friday morning, a series of workshops Friday afternoon, a hospitality suite at the Embassy Suites hotel on Friday evening and the awards dinner on Saturday night. The main event of the weekend though was the car show held on Saturday, October 19th at the BMW Manufacturing Facility in Greer, South Carolina.

The morning started off with a light rain and fog, resembling Pebble Beach in some ways, but by late morning the rain ended and the temperatures were in the high 60s. By 10:30 in the morning there were 373 of Europe's finest, representing 30 marques in 55 classes spread out across the lawns surrounding the BMW Zentrum museum and the entrance to the BMW Manufacturing plant. The variety of vehicles present had something for everyone, from a 1934 Rolls Royce 20/25 up to many fine examples of 2013 machinery. The major sponsors brought along a host of display vehicles, including representatives from Ferrari, Maserati, BMW and Lotus. There was a repeat visit by the Russian Tupolev 007 Cosmonaut Recovery Vehicle as well. The featured margue for the show was Ferrari. Despite the iffy weather at the start of the day, 52 of the 57 registered Ferraris made it on to the show field. It was an awesome sight seeing that many prancing horses spread out on the lawn next to the Zentrum.

The BMW crowd was very well represented at the show. There were 46 BMWs entered for judging, ranging from early 2800cs and 3.0CSs to a 2013 M5. The BMW marque represented the third largest turnout of the entire show. Well-done BMW. While most of the BMWs entered were members of the Sandlapper and Tarheel Chapters, there were also cars from Georgia, Virginia, Maryland and other areas of the South. All in all, the BMW contingent was large enough to be divided into six classes for judging.

In addition to the BMWs entered in the show, there were 11 MINIs entered in two classes. They ranged from a 1955 Morris Minor to a 2013 MINI Cooper S JCW. The MINI crowd went above and beyond by displaying some of their vehicles along with period accessories and picnic setups. There was even a 1975 MINI Pick Up Truck entered.

Corky Coker, noted automotive aficionado and owner of the Coker Group was on hand for the event as guest judge and keynote speaker at the awards banquet held at the Embassy Suites Hotel. He gave those in attendance an overview of his background, how he got involved with cars in general and how he has turned his passion for automobiles into an automotive empire. Corky was very approachable and he commented on both the quality of the cars and the friendliness of the people in attendance.

One of the show's sponsors, Hagerty Collector Car Insurance, conducted their "Operation Ignite! Youth Judging" program. This program gave 8 children, ranging in age from 6 to 16 the chance to get up close to collector automobiles. Led by an adult guide

through the show, Youth Judges learned the basics of judging while taking a look at selected vehicles, interacting with owners and learning details, facts and the history of each vehicle. This is a great way to introduce the next generation to the car hobby and to ensure the hobby's long-term growth. The Youth Judges at this year's event again presented their award to Ralph Gresens and his 2001 Lamborghini Diablo. This was the second year in a row they presented the award to Ralph.

The BMW CCA National Office had a great presence at the show as well. They had a tent set up to promote membership in the club and to sell BMW CCA merchandise. BMW CCA also arranged for Spaten Beer, a national sponsor of BMW CCA, to be on-site. Spaten had a beer garden set-up in the food area and gave away commemorative glasses and free samples of Spaten beer to those of age. Many thanks to BMW CCA for their participation and support.

By 2:30 Saturday afternoon, the votes had been counted and the winners were announced. The overall winner for People's Choice was a gorgeous red 1972 Ferrari Dino 246GT presented by Dean Stribling. The car looked stunning and was a great representative of the Dino contingent.

MINI is getting serious about speed, although, they always have been. Being unveiled at next years Detroit Auto Show, the new John Cooper Works Concept has been designed for speed, but doesn't rule out the overall practicality of the car. An elongated jowl (aka grille) which eliminated the area that was previously devoted for fog lights. This offers up optimum air intake and, let's face it, it just looks cooler. When you're avoiding driving through fog due to lack of lights, you'll be impressed by the overall increase of "go kart feel" with lighter alloy wheels and additional body components located around the C pillar to increase to aerodynamics while the car is in spirited driving mode. This leads to a supple feeling, but at the same time gives you the confidence to take corners a little quicker. My advice, reserve one quickly. They'll go fast.

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
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The Sandlapper Superstars Of The Quarter: All of us!
