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PAUL HOECKE Notes from the road The Magnificent Seven – A Salute

If you've been a club member for some years and have, on occasion, glanced at the Special Interest Groups (SIG) section in ROUNDEL, you may have noticed how much that section's content has changed over time.

Ten years ago, it listed twenty-three groups devoted to the care, preservation and enjoyment of certain categories or specific models of BMWs; today, you'll see only a bit more than half that number on that page. What's more, the groups have changed too. Some have morphed into something different from what they were before. Others have been added in the interim as certain newer models with special appeal attracted their own sets of fans. Yet others have disappeared altogether.

Among the groups that have disappeared – I believe the proper term is 'de-listed' – are the Senior Six Registry, devoted to the E3 series sedans, and more recently the Magnificent Seven Digest, which mainly focused on E23, E32 and E38 series BMWs. In both cases, the official version is that they were dropped due to a 'lack of participation', whatever that means. My personal take is that this happened because they represented 4-door sedans, which get a lot less respect from BMW fans than their glitzy 2-door cousins such as the 3.0CS and the 6 Series – despite being virtually identical under the hood. But that's just me.

To be absolutely fair, this is all part of the natural BMW life cycle: As those veterans become rarer by the year, newer, flashier models will perforce move to the fore in BMW fans' hearts and minds. But the mere fact that ROUNDEL no longer lists these groups doesn't mean they're dead. Like the proverbial old soldiers, they've merely faded from public view – gone underground, if you will. And their members, though fewer in numbers today than in their heyday, are just as enthusiastic about their cars as ever. Just drop by Scott Sturdy's annual Vintage show if you want proof.

More to my point though, the reason these groups survive is networking, usually because someone has cared enough to maintain an online forum of one kind or another. Parts, if they're still available, aren't that hard to find. What a forum does is enable classic car fans to exchange information, seek advice and, yes, pick up some moral support. Yet, nothing goes on forever; in time, circumstances force the people who run these sites to quit. It's what has happened to the Magnificent Seven Digest.

In May, Chris Koch – one of the driving forces behind the Digest since years before ROUNDEL started listing SIGs – announced that he was shutting it down. Reading his farewell message on the Digest site, I thought it only proper to give it a wider audience by including it in today's column. I'm doing this not so much to mourn the Digest's passing as to recognize and salute the enthusiasm, dedication and expertise Chris and his collaborators showed in carrying on their mission for all those many years. So, read on.

ALL GOOD THINGS MUST COME TO AN END – by Chris Koch

The BMW Seven Digest has had a long run since it started in October 1995 – just three months after the World Wide Web started. We were the first to help owners discuss, diagnose and offer repair instructions on their Seven Series BMWs (and some other Series along the way). Frank Bresz got the Digest rolling on a LINUX server and was shortly joined by contributors Pat Retlewski, Avery Dee (deceased) and Yours Truly. Kevin Kiely was another early regular.

We settled on the simple text format sent once each day mainly because of me. I disliked the five-second thoughtless sound bites of the rest of the WWW blogs (called 'weblogs' in late 1997, 'blogs' in May 1999), while our 24-hour format forced correspondents to carefully word their requests and solutions for peer review all over the world. All of us were subject to criticism anytime we didn't carefully consider our answers! The end result was a very usable constant discourse and information exchange.

These days, I often find our diagnostic and repair information integrated into modern websites (usually un-credited, but such is the way, I guess) that have photos and pretty color text to make them more socially attractive.

The Editor's Desk...

This month I want to bring to your attention a bulletin from the SEAM Action Network - "U.S. Congress Introduces Bill to Reform Ethanol Mandate> Legislation (HR 704) has been introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives to prohibit the sale of E15 (gasoline that is 15% ethanol) and eliminate the federal Renewable Fuel Standard's (RFS) mandate that 15 billion gallons of cornbased ethanol be blended into the U.S. fuel supply each year.

The EPA has turned to sales of E15 to achieve the law's artificial mandate. Ethanol, especially in higher concentrations such as E15, can cause damage to older vehicles.

Ethanol can cause metal corrosion and dissolve certain plastics and rubbers, especially in older vehicles that were not constructed with ethanol-compatible materials. HR 704 would eliminate the unrealistic mandates imposed under the RFS such as requiring refiners to blend 36 billion gallons of biofuels by 2022."

E10 is already causing issues with fuel systems. What do they think E15 will do? *-ed.*



During my first ten years of the Seven Digest I corresponded actively 365 days per year, usually between 12 a.m. and 3 a.m. when the family was asleep (and I woke up each day between 5:30 and 6 a.m. as I owned a computer business from 1885 to 2006). I quickly learned that when I wrote an entry, I had to draft the response and then rewrite it a dozen times so it read smoothly and also gave me the time to fact-check it. Whenever I gave a quick response, I usually got in trouble (flamed was the word).

I belong to many blogs and find it amazing how technical topics whip around in whacky directions, with short-spurt answers that seldom make sense. You have to sift through a lot of chaff to get solid answers. But one can't complain too much; the answer you need is indeed out there – somewhere.

While some of us still have E23s, E32s and E38s hanging around because the damn things won't die, it is apparent that the majority of us have moved on. I jumped ship for a couple of years to a 2002 Audi S8 and now have a 2007 MB S550 4-Matic for my summer driver, as well as a 2006 Honda CR-V AWD as my winter car. [Ed.

Note: Chris lives in the Buffalo, NY area!]

I still have a collection of BMWs (Sevens, Fivers and a '90 325is) in the warehouse that I glance at once every few years. But I'm long past the point when I should have sold them.

I regret closing down the site, but spending the money every year in this day of pretty pictures, videos and colorful text is a waste of resources, so I had to force myself to stop. I have truly enjoyed visiting many of you through the years around the USA – something that would never have happened without the BMW Seven Digest.

So, goodbye, farewell, and may you enjoy many great cars in your future! -Chris Koch



CLUB RACING REPORT BY PAUL HOECKE

Tarheels Race At Barber; NASA Hyperfest At VIR

Hello again, fellow club racing fans. Now that summer is here officially as well as in reality, the BMW CCA Club Racing (CR) season is really hitting its stride. A glance at the CR calendar will show that it's already been a pretty busy scene these past two months, even if we only count CR events at tracks east of the Mississippi. And there's plenty more on the schedule in the weeks and months ahead. But don't count on a lot of members of our homegrown racing crowd to show up at upcoming races.

Let's face it: Past history shows that once the spring race at VIR is history, local racers don't exactly flock in great numbers to other CR events. Mind you, it's not because they're not motivated. But they're not pros; they race because they enjoy it. And in all fairness, most of them have other obligations this time of year, like jobs, and instructing at driving schools, and family vacations, to name but a few. No wonder we met a couple of them, taking it easy as spectators at the Vintage show in May.

It's also why we're not surprised that of the two CR events held that same weekend as the Vintage, at Mid-Ohio and Barber, only the latter event had any local hot shoes take part. (However, as you'll see below, there are other racing venues where some of our racers like to get their licks in.)

As far as the Barber race goes, it appears that the event – a four-sprint affair with all the races

for points – was not exactly a happy experience for the three local racers that did make it to that event – or for that matter some of their competitors too.

In fact, for two of our guys – Phil Antoine and Jack Wilkins co-driving Antoine's Spec E36 car – it was over within seconds after the green flag flew for the first race, as Wilkins got tangled in a twocar incident three turns into the very first lap. This left both of them out of action for the rest of the weekend. Antoine later said: "It put an early end to an already short weekend. I was so distracted by our situation that I didn't notice much else. But at least the museum visit Friday was awesome."

The third Tarheel driver, Dennis Pippy, fared only a bit better. He finished a respectable third in IP (4th overall in a 24-car field) in that first sprint, but evidently ran out of luck in the next race. All we know at this point is that his car's motor 'failed' after he'd completed only three laps, which left him a DNF; and that he did not run in the two remaining races.

To be fair to our guys, the event must have been pretty hard on a lot of the other participants as well. And it wasn't the fault of the weather, which was fine. The only other Spec E36 driver in the first race ran into a wall just nine turns after Wilkins' wreck, and that's just one example. By our count, there were enough DNFs and DQs later on to shrink the field to less than half its original size by the time the last race got underway. To quote Antoine, "it was an altogether strange weekend."

Last month's CR schedule listed two events, the race at NJMP's Thunderbolt course and the Stan Parker race at Watkins Glen, which might have drawn a few local racers. But at press time, neither event's entry roster contained a single individual from our neck of the woods. And so far, the same is true of the race at PIRC near Pittsburgh.

On the other hand, May saw a bunch of local hot shoes race in NASA's Hyperfest at VIR. By our count, there were at least five of them there, including Al 'the Rev' Taylor and Paul Patrick in the Lightning run group, and Sanjeev Duggal, Jason Tower and Madison Whittle in the Thunder group. (And more to our point about local racers competing outside of CR, all of them except Duggal generally stick with NASA and, in the Rev's case, vintage racing as well.)

With one or two exceptions, they ran pretty

well in their respective classes: Patrick in Spec E30; Duggal in GTS3; Tower in Spec E46; and Whittle in GTS2. But the best result was posted by Taylor. He won GTS1 in Sunday's race, finishing on the lead lap while his class rivals ended up several laps down.

By now, it's pretty obvious that our local racing crowd loves to race at VIR regardless of which sanctioning body happens to stage an event there. What may not be as obvious is that many out-of-state racers feel the same about our home track. It's why we thought we'd share some comments to that effect which we recently received via e-mail from Dave Thoman, the fourfold GTS3 winner at VIR in April.

The race marked his return to VIR after a three-year absence, and it was evidently quite a revelation. "The track is so-o-o much better since the repaving," he says. He feels it helped make April "by far the best month I've had participating in this sport, all around!"

What's more, he credits the track and the event with making his dad, Bob, a faster driver.

"[Dad] is just past his rookie phase as a club racer," he explains, "and he's a bit more conservative than most racers, spending a lot of time with eyes in the rear view mirrors. We spent Thursday (BimmerWorld Practice Day) trying to get him in the sub-2:20s to no avail. What he needed was competition as that is what brings out better lap times than any practice."

Dave's solution was to lobby his fellow racers to replace one of the scheduled practices Saturday with a fun race. "We voted for it during the driver meeting Saturday morning and the Race Director [Mike Hinkley] approved it. My Dad ran that race, magically clicking off 2:15s chasing after competition. He was grinning ear to ear when his helmet came off!" No wonder that Bob was the co-driver that helped Dave secure a class victory in the enduro that afternoon.

We should add that in recognition of Dave's efforts to stage the fun race instead of a second practice, he was voted the Spirit of Club Racing flag at the final awards meeting. We think this is a great father-son racing story, as well as a testimonial. We certainly appreciate it, as do members of the Tarheel racing community. Even though in this case Dave is preaching to the choir, it's always nice to know how visiting racers feel about our home track and our homegrown racing crowd.

Moving on to the pro scene, Team Bimmer-World Racing (BWR) was headed for Round Four of the IMSA CTSCC race series at Watkins Glen when we filed this report. But since that race took place only a week or so before this issue reached you, you won't see any results here until next month. All we can say now is that, having finished sixth in ST at Laguna Seca seven weeks earlier, James Clay and his track warriors were looking forward to doing better at the Glen – while keeping their fingers crossed that heat and metal fatigue wouldn't cause them any more problems. So stay tuned.



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
