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PAUL HOECKE Notes from the road The Long Road Traveled

Let's face it: This month is, typically, not a great favorite of us Joy of Driving aficionados.

What with Mother Nature's moods blowing hot and cold – literally – those of us who prefer our BMWs to be rolling rather than sitting still find ourselves in a quandary: Should we head out and risk the slings and arrows of outraged weather gods, not to mention mud, icy patches, fallen trees and – Oh yeah – drivers who've forgotten everything about winter driving? (That is assuming they knew something about that in the first place.) Or should we leave our Bimmers tucked away, safe, warm and dry, while we use a trusty ol' winter-dedicated beater on our daily rounds?

It's a tough choice, and one that isn't open to everyone. I mean, most of us still need to get out there, to work or run errands. And how many of us have one of those fallback vehicles in reserve. Personally, I can't wait for Ray Korman's Open House next month. By then, conditions are usually a lot more tolerable, if not actually spring-like. (As I recall, the occasional snow flurries that have, at times, surprised everyone at this event don't amount to much.)

In the meantime, though, this is still February. As far as weather goes, I may yet be pleasantly surprised, but I'm not betting on it. And while I'm no chicken when it comes to driving in bad weather, neither do I believe in doing the Neither Rain, Nor Snow, Nor Gloom of Night thing to the max. (I'm retired, meaning I don't have to.) So I've been taking the safe route these past few weeks. Any time I stuck my head out the front door and things didn't look so good, I've retreated to the warmth of my abode and settled down to do something comfy and productive, like watching racing videos and reading.

Okay, maybe the former wouldn't cut it as a

productive activity with a lot of folks out there, but I think you'll understand. As for the reading part – well, I guess it won't surprise you if some of that also has to do with the whole automotive scene. And usually it's interesting, even thoughtprovoking stuff.

Like for instance, leafing through last month's issue of Scientific American the other day, I came across the magazine's monthly "50, 100 & 150 Years Ago" retrospective. One of two January 1916 pieces about cars was a story by an anonymous writer about how he took his "annual vacation this year [presumably in the spring of 1915] in the form of a trip by automobile to the Pacific Coast over the Lincoln Highway." It was revealing, to say the least!

(FYI, road trip junkies: Built in 1913, this was the first U.S. transcontinental road. It ran from New York City to San Francisco; its route corresponded for the most part to I-80, although some sections matched today's numbered US highways, such as US 33 in Pennsylvania and US 29 in Nevada; and it was evidently nothing like the roads we take today, as some of its sections remained unpaved until 1930!)

Two things impressed me about this story. One was the writer, who must have been a real pioneer in his day. It seems he'd made the same trip in 1913, when he was "one of perhaps 50 tourists who took the same journey." So his 1915 trip was a study in contrasts, as he was "but one out of 5,000 who essayed to reach the Pacific Coast by motor." Yet even then, two years after the highway's completion, the trip entailed "a series of experiences" that, in his opinion, would have trumped any adventure fiction at the time. He must have been a brave soul; too bad he didn't say what kind of car he drove. What's most impressive, though, is the contrast between then and now in how we view traveling by car. Today, a century later, we think nothing of hopping in our BMWs and heading down the road to a BMW CCA event or club race. It may take us fifty, a hundred, or maybe even a few hundred miles from home, but barring bad weather or rush hour traffic, it's no big deal. (Unless, that is, you're piloting an ailing 2002tii from East Awfulgosh, MA, to The Vintage or Oktoberfest.) And it's pretty much the same for the rest of the driving public. According to Triple-A, upward of 90 million people took to the road this past Christmas season! We sure have come a long way, baby!

One could call this roadie flood a reaffirmation of America's hallowed love affair with the automobile. What with gasoline prices currently flirting with the equivalent (i.e. adjusted for inflation) of 1970s numbers at the pump, and car sales expected to reach near-record levels, who is to argue. But according to another piece of reading matter that recently fell into my lap, this freedom of the road lifestyle may be in for a sea change of

sorts, and sooner than we may expect. At least, that's how syndicated automotive critic and prognosticator extraordinaire Dan Neil sees it.

I came across Neil's idea of the future in an article he wrote for a special Wall Street Journal publication (Dec. 2015) with the cover title 'The Future of Everything'. That certainly piqued my interest; I love futurist stuff, despite what the Great Yogi said about it being tough to make predictions about the future. But my enthusiasm quickly turned into something approaching heartburn when I saw the title of Neil's piece.

It read: Kiss Your Car Goodbye. Say what? Well, that hit me where it counts! But once I'd gotten over my initial shock and started reading the article, I realized its title was a bit misleading; in characteristic fashion, Neil had gone for a dramatic opening by leaving out 'personal'. So it wasn't quite as scary as it looked. Yet even then, the idea that the personal car may become a thing of the past within the next couple of decades was still pretty hard to swallow for a car nut like me. (I also detected some flaws in the concept, but I'll get to that below.)

Basically, Neil's argument goes like this: The gazillions of cars now being produced and bought are "an ocean, an inundation" that threatens to overwhelm industrialized society. Yet their 'utilization rate' in the U.S. (i.e. the amount of time they are in actual use in a day) is around 5 percent; the rest of the time, they just sit there, "like condos on the beach." So, what if, instead of everyone owning cars, we could share them when we need them, just like condos? And he sees autonomous cars that don't require a human driver as being the driving force behind this transformation.

It's a lengthy argument, so I'll cut to the chase. Neil paints a glowing picture of a world where cleaned and fueled "vehicles a la carte" delivered to your doorstep upon request will eliminate the year-round costs and obligations of owning a car – insurance, car loans, maintenance – not to mention the decline in traffic jams and accidents that will result from these self-driving "automotive avatars." He also cites a Rand Corporation report which says that sharing of autonomous vehicles will provide transportation for people unable to get around otherwise – i.e. "the blind, disabled, and those too young to drive."

It's a beguiling vision, to be sure – until you start asking questions. For one thing, this whole concept sounds like just the ticket for the millions living in heavily-urbanized metro areas. But what about the millions who live out in the countryside, places typical of our state? They'll still be out there decades from now. Will they have instant access to transportation on demand? I think not.

Another aspect of this concept that feels snarky is: Who will provide (read: own) these automotive avatars? Is it going to be the likes of Hertz. Avis and their kin: or maybe evolutionary versions of Uber and Lyft? In either case, their customers (i.e. you and me) will be beholden to these organizations in one way or another. It sounds like trading one creditor, today's bank that provides the car loan, for another entity which may not be as transparent. What's more, these entities will be competing with one another, so if you were to look around for the best price for a day or week in a pickup, or econo-box, or BMW, vou'd have to have an account with each of these organizations. Talk about a financial morass! (The alternative – a Big Brother government agency that parcels out vehicles on request - is too dreadful an idea for even the bravest soul to contemplate.) There's more I could quibble with, but I think you get the picture.

Rounding out his vision, Neil claims that "twenty-five years from now, the only people still owning cars will be hobbyists, hot-rodders and flat-earth dissenters." I beg to differ. Given the size and nature of this country, there will always be vast numbers of people who will stick to personal cars, out of necessity or convenience. As for those 'hobbyists' he dismisses so easily, they're not going away any time soon. It has me wonder: Has he hung around any of our club members of late?

CLUB RACING REPORT

A Blurry Look In The Rearview Mirror

This is that time of year when we're tucked in between two racing seasons. Officially, 2015 is ancient history and the 2016 BMW CCA Club Racing (CR) season is off and running. But in reality, the 2016 action is still in the future, at least as far as our neck of the woods is concerned. Namely, as we file this report, all of the CR events are taking place out there, west of the Father of Waters.

It's kind of like being in what CB-talking truckers call 'the rocking chair' – the space between a rig in front and another one in back. We know what's behind us, but when it comes to what's in front, the view is limited. It's okay when you're motoring down the super slab on cruise control, but it's frustrating when we're supposed to be telling you about all the action our homegrown racing crowd has been getting into and we can't, because there hasn't been any.

In the absence of racing news, it would be a convenient fallback for us to report which local racers captured CR class championships in 2015, but we're somewhat at a loss on that score as well. Nationally, none of our hot shoes made it to the top of the heap. And regional championships were unavailable at press time because (we're told) the CR folks were still working to correct some flaw in their software. As a result, we can only make some wild-ass guesses as to which local track warriors may have won a 2015 South Atlantic class crown. According to our count, it's a very short list.

Based strictly on national standings and point totals, we probably have just one 2015 re-

gional champion in our midst: April Curtis. She finished third in DM nationally, but seems assured of the regional title because the two class rivals ahead of her in the national standings hail from Canada and the Pacific Region, respectively.

That being said, there are other members of the Tarheel racing community who also deserve to be recognized. For one, we think honorable mention should go to Tom Tice. He raced consistently and finished well in Spec E36 all season long, and only missed taking the regional class title by placing second in the national standings behind another South Atlantic driver, largely because the other guy showed up at twice as many races as Tom. It's also only fair to point out that, right behind Tom, the national standings list a veritable parade of three more local Spec E36 pilots: Phil Antoine, Mark Fishero and Jack Wilkins. You can bet your bootie we'll be watching these guys this coming season.

Two more Tarheel drivers, Dennis Pippy and Billy Glavin, deserve our salute as well. Although both finished 'only' fourth nationally, we recognize them for having done so while facing some pretty awesome odds. In Pippy's case, it was the fact that he raced in the biggest and (arguably) most dog-eat-dog class in CR, placing fourth out of fifty-three I-Prepared contenders! As for Glavin, he too raced and finished in the money – when he chose to race, which wasn't often; and he had to contend with fourteen other M3T competitors vying for the national class crown. In other words, they both had a steep hill to climb. Finally, lest we forget, our caps are off to the dozens of other local track warriors who contributed their share to the competition, excitement and fun of Club Racing wherever and whenever each one of them chose to race. We're looking forward to watching their exploits in the months to come.

Moving on to the pro scene, BimmerWorld Racing (BWR) has been working hard to overcome the problems that made their 2015 IMSA CRSCC season a frustrating succession of breakdowns, with only a few bright moments in between. To achieve better results in the new season, team owner/driver James Clay is taking a twofold approach – making his cars more reliable and reshuffling his driver lineup.

During the offseason, BWR has focused on eliminating the cooling problems that plagued the team's two F30-based Street Tuner (ST) entries last season. "This little 4-cylinder turbo makes good power, but it also makes a lot of heat in racing conditions," says Clay. So BWR's goal has been to produce an engine that's at least as fast as before but is also way more reliable.

As far as the driver lineup goes, Clay has opted for a mix of proven and new talent. With Andrie Hartanto and Jason Briedis gone, BWR standout Tyler Cooke moves over to join Clay in the No. 81 328i, while the No. 84 car will be in new hands: Jerry Kaufman, a newcomer to BWR whom Clay has brought over from BMW CCA Club Racing; and Kyle Tilley, a veteran of several other racing series who also has been Kaufman's longtime coach.

Publicly, Clay expects the new car/driver combo to "steer BimmerWorld and its F30s to the front" in their pursuit of the 2016 Street Tuner championship. Privately, our bet is he is keeping all of his fingers (and maybe his toes too) crossed.

As you read this, the first race, at Daytona, is history, having run the weekend just before this issue of FOOTNOTES came out. So any report on how BWR did will have to wait. The next race, at Sebring, is set to run the middle of next month, followed by Laguna Seca in late April.

It's unclear if these long intervals between races are dictated by track availability or intended to allow teams to sort out their cars early in the series. In any case, this leisurely pace should offer BWR some welcome time to iron out any teething problems their cars encounter early on. They'll need it, because things speed up quite a bit thereafter, with three races in July, when ambient heat will once again become their challenge.

As far as all of you local pro racing fans are concerned, we hardly need to remind you that the series will return to VIR in August. If the past is any indication, it will be another absolutely fantastic event. In the meantime, we wish Clay and his troops the very best of racer's luck.
