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# PAUL HOECKE Notes from the road Murphy Was An Optimist

You're probably familiar with Murphy's Law. In fact, I'll bet any owner of a BMW or other make car is acquainted with it – providing he or she spends any amount of time poking around under the hood or in any other part of said vehicle's innards. And that goes double for the mechanics – sorry, Technicians – who get paid for doing this, whether they work for an authorized dealer or an independent. But for the record – and at the risk of being redundant – I'll remind you of what the law is all about.

Basically, Murphy's Law states that if anything can go wrong, it will.

Of course, like any rule we make up, it also has developed many corollaries, clauses and subsets which fit a myriad of situations. However, it appears that their main function is to provide any wrench twirler who has come to grief in any way, big or small, with convenient excuses why things did go wrong

All that leads me to a question that has bothered me for quite some time: Is Murphy's Law truly a law?

And upon careful consideration, I'd say that it isn't. As I see it, it isn't up there with, say, Newton's Third Law, which states that for each action there's an equal and opposite reaction. (The fact that you recoil after painfully bumping your head against your car's hood has nothing to do with Murphy's Law.)

I don't know who Murphy was, but it strikes me that his alleged law is in the same category as two other so-called laws which also offer useful explanations for failure. There's the Peter Principle which (as you may recall) proposes that any working individual shall be promoted up to and including the level of his or her incompetence. One of its corollaries states that those who can't do, teach; those who can't teach, administrate; and those who can't administrate are wont to theorize, philosophize or (if they have a law degree) legislate. Applied to car work, this encompasses all those kibitzers who offer you unwanted (and bad) advice but won't lift a finger to help while you wrench.

And then there's Meier's Maxim, which states that any fact which contradicts or otherwise doesn't fit a particular theory shall be disposed of. I won't go into really big issues (such as Climate Change) where this may apply, but I will suggest that it's a phenomenon encountered time and again in many garages. ("Yeah, those coolant hoses may be ten years old, but they still look pretty good to me.")

What I'm driving at is that in reality, Murphy's Law is mainly if not exclusively about human error. And to prove my point, allow me to cite a few real-life examples.

One of Murphy's corollaries states that Interchangeable Parts Don't. We – i.e. several BMW cognoscenti including me – were recently faced with this one while installing a new windshield on an E 30. Everything was ready. The rubber seal which goes around the windshield had arrived via FedEx; the part number on the package matched the specs; soapy water was at hand. But when we started fitting the seal onto the windshield, it turned out to be more than two inches too long! (Expletive deleted!)

Clearly, the seal must have been packed by someone who was either lusting for a hot date Friday night or too hung over to see straight Monday morning. If that ain't human error, what is?

Another one of Murphy's clauses has it that a Broken Component Shall Be Found To Be Fine – After It's Been Replaced. This is the scenario popularized in jokes about surgeons amputating the wrong limb, but it also occurs when a car problem is fixed by progressively throwing new parts (and money) at it.

In my case, it was a yaw sensor on my Z 3 which dashboard lights said needed replacing. But after doing so with a huge amount of effort (removing a car seat is no fun), and at great expense I might add, those stupid lights were still on. A check of the code reader (something I should've done to begin with) showed that it was actually the much cheaper sensor next to the yaw gizmo that needed replacing! (Duh!)

Finally, I'll mention Murphy's dictum that a dropped component or tool will fall in precisely

## CLUB RACING REPORT BY PAUL HOECKE Wilkins, Glavin Post Three Wins Each at VIR

Welcome to May, fellow club racing fans! Now that the 2017 racing season is in full swing, we may expect an uptick in action on tracks around our neck of the woods. We are of course talking mainly about events put on by sanctioning bodies favored by members of our homegrown racing crowd – BMW CCA Club Racing (CR), NASA and ChumpCar's Eastern Division. The CR scene in particular may get more exciting for our track warriors if a rumored development – the inclusion of other marques in addition to BMW – takes effect.

How much of that is actually gonna happen is up to the powers that be, as well as our local hot shoes and the time and effort they're willing and able to muster. All we can promise is that we'll try to keep up. Meanwhile, here's what's been happening these past couple of months.

Taking first things first, last month's club race at VIR lived up to expectations and then some. With close to fifty cars in ten classes and some fifty-five drivers, the field was right-sized for the track and competitive too. What's more, one-third of the entrants were from our chapter. In fact, the ten-car Spec E36 contingent was almost entirely made up of local drivers. And except for gusty, chilly winds on Friday, the weekend's weather was sunny and mild. So what's not to like?

Well, maybe the only fly in the ointment from our standpoint was that in the event's three races – two 20-minute sprints with a one-hour enduro in between – only a few local hot shoes finished anywhere near the front. Some of that was due to several really fast frontrunners like C-Mod racer Todd Brown, who set a pace no one could match to win overall in all three races with margins as high as 43 seconds. But the recently repaved track may have had a lot to do with this too, as a number of drivers (including several of our track warriors) posted personal record times.

Still, our guys were no slouches. All but two completed all three races, and a few finished in the money. Rich Abraham (IP E36 M3) posted the two highest finishes by a Tarheel driver with a class victory in fourth place overall in the long race and sixth overall in the first sprint. But John Wilkins was the most consistent, fending off challenges from several local class rivals to post three Spec E36 class victories. Billy Glavin, the lone E30 M3 divers at the event, also chalked up three solo M3T wins; and April Curtis took the D-Mod crown in the first sprint.

And lest we forget, the VDCA part of the event also saw several local drivers hit the track in their BMWs. Ray Korman was there in his No.28 325e, and so was Al 'the Rev' Taylor. In fact, Al won his class with a seventh-overall finish in the Vintage enduro; and so did Billy Glavin, who teamed up with his dad Bill in their vintage 3.0 CSL to take the checker in fifth overall. All in all, it was great racing weekend all around.

Meanwhile, Tarheel racers were also pretty busy on local NASA circuits. Three of them – Chip Stabler and Phil Franz (both in GTS3), and Paul Patrick (Spec E30) – raced in the Southeast Region's event at Roebling Road on the same weekend as the CR race at VIR. Stabler and Franz finished one-two in class in each of the weekend's two sprint races, while Patrick ended up in midpack both times. Previously, in March, Franz had also chalked up one class win in the 'Race for the Pi' at Road Atlanta. And the Mid-Atlantic Region's 'March Madness' race at VIR saw a familiar cast of characters as seven local hot shoes came to do battle in two classes. Four of them – Carter Hunt, Colin Fabeny, Patrick and the 'Rev' – ran with the 23-car Spec E30 contingent, while three more – Jason Weaver, Sanjeev Duggal and Rich Zulman – duked it out in GTS3.

Weaver posted the best result, finishing second in class in the event's first sprint. Hunt also did well, with sixth and fifth-place finishes in that big E30 group, but the others ended up mainly in mid-pack both times – except for Duggal, who sat out the second race.

As far as local drivers go, the only hiatus we've noted was in the ChumpCar World Series. Although there were several Eastern Division races after the 12-hour event at VIR in March (covered in last month's report), all took place far enough from our neck of the woods to keep local teams from showing up. So the next race likely to see our track warriors compete is a 24-hour endurance event at VIR in August.

On the pro racing front, BimmerWorld Racing (BWR) once again encountered problems in the season's second Continental Tire Sportscar Challenge race at Sebring in March. Only this time, it was fuel. Team owner James Clay qualified second and led the Street Tuner (ST) field during his stint at the wheel of the No. 84 328i. But a fueling problem during the handover to co-driver Tyler Cooke resulted in what Clay described as a "terrible" two-minute delay, so that Cooke started his stint in 13th place. But Cooke put the pedal to the metal, reeling in a bunch of cars, which enabled him to finish in sixth place.

BWR's other entry, the No.81 328i of Ari Balogh and Greg Liefooghe, started 14th, but Balogh was able to move up during his stint so that Liefooghe took over while running seventh. He ran well, moving up to as high as 4th place – until about four minutes before the checker, when the car ran out of fuel! That dropped them to fifteenth place at the finish. (Bummer!)

As you read this, Clay and his troops are in Austin, doing battle in Round Three of the series at COTA. If you feel like watching the action live, do like we do – catch it as it streams on the IMSA Racing site. (The dates are May 5 - 7.)

## BMW CCA Foundation BY PAUL DUNLEVY, President, Tarheel Chapter, BMW CCA

It was our pleasure to have Scott Hughes speak at our Annual Banquet this year. In addition to enjoying his history and his amazing cars, we were reminded of the importance of the BMW CCA Foundation and how much it has grown. For those of you not familiar with the Foundation, I wanted to review what it is and why it is so important.

In March of 2002, the BMW CCA formed the non-profit, tax-exempt charitable BMW CCA Foundation, Inc. The Foundation has several missions: to educate new young drivers through the Street Survival safety program; to collect, preserve, and document the Club's and BMW's history in America through a library, archives, and museum; and to collect and preserve examples of the BMW vehicles that were important to the growth of the brand.

Since the Foundation's acquired property and a building adjacent to the Performance Center in South Carolina at 190 Manatee Court Greer, South Carolina 29651, it has become an outstanding museum and archive. It is one of the world's pre-eminent resources for information about BMWs and BMW history.

Michael Mitchell, the Foundation Curator, said in a recent article in the Sandlapper Newsletter, "Maybe it has been a while since you have visited or maybe you have never been here, so come by and check out the cool cars and motorcycles we have on display. Some of the cars only stay for a short period of time, so our displays are constantly rotating. Currently, we have a 1938 328 Roadster along with a Sbarro 328 clone. At the time of writing this article, we have 19 cars and 3 motorcycles, many of which are on loan from members."


