CLUB RACING REPORT.

Skidmark Racing Wins Big in Chumpcar Bash at VIR

Hello again, fellow club racing fans! By any measure except one, the racing season for all non-pro motorsports organizations such as BMW CCA Club Racing (CR) and NASA has been underway for quite a while. But when it comes to local hot shoes burning rubber on any track, the momentum has been decidedly slow to develop – with one significant exception: Last month's ChumpCar (CC) event at VIR.

Unlike other recent CC events which used an 8-hour plus 8-hour format, this race was a straightforward 12-hour endurance battle on our home track's 1.65-mile South Course. It involved 63 teams, at least initially, in (we believe) six classes. And most important from our standpoint, it included the 28-car Class C, a BMW-dominated group which featured at least four teams made up largely if not entirely of Tarheel Chapter members – Skidmark Racing, No Panic, Red Rooster and Bad Brains

Mind you, that alone meant there were anywhere between thirty and forty members of our homegrown racing crowd putting pedal to the metal during this grueling contest. (The number is only an estimate we base on past experience, but it's close to the truth.) But the best part was the outcome of the race; namely, Skidmark took the whole ball of wax with an overall win!

Skidmark should be familiar to a lot of you from vintage racing, where the team's 2002s – especially Perry Genova's fast and very pretty '02 – have made their mark time and again. This time, though, their entry was the red No.205 1987 325 they keep around for occasions like this one. The car did its drivers proud, as the team completed 446 laps on their way to victory. It must have been

close, for another BMW team finished only 2.7 seconds later, still on the lead lap. But a win is a win, we say.

Clearly, it was endurance and consistency, not speed that carried the day (and night) for the Skidmarkers. The fastest lap of the event was set by a Class D Firebird, but that car only completed 300 laps. And our winners weren't all that much slower either; their best lap was only some two seconds slower than the Firebird's. But consistent driving and great pit work was what really counted, as the rest of the field finished no closer than two laps behind the two frontrunners.

What's more, the other local teams did very well too, considering they were competing against 20-plus determined class rivals. Not having all the details about who drove what, we have to guess about that. But be that as it may, No Panic, which usually has Mike Hinkley and Reg Williams at the wheel of the '84 E30 318i, completed 435 laps to finish fourth in class. Red Rooster, which typically includes Scott McDuffie in the '87 325is, came in fifth with 431 laps. And Bad Brains, with (probably) Tom Tice, Rich Abraham and a few other Tarheelers driving their '93 325i, completed 427 laps (along with three other teams) to take the checker in seventh place. How they all accomplished this is something we'll leave for next time, when we've had a chance to talk to some of the participants.

In contrast, the rest of the local racing scene is something of an anticlimax, at least so far. The field at last month's CR event at Barber was apparently devoid of any local hot shoes. And our CR season's first big event, the race at VIR this month, is of course still in our future as you read this. As for NASA, we can't really say much about

what local track warriors have done for a couple of reasons. For one thing, the Southeast Region's 'Winter Meltdown' race at CMP back in February saw only one local racer, Colin Fabeny, compete with 8th and 11th place finishes in a large Spec E30 field. But the region's 'Race for the Pi' at Road Atlanta last month happened after we filed this report; and the same goes for Mid-Atlantic's race at VIR. Like we said, it's still a waiting game as far as those racing venues go.

It's no different when it comes to pro racing. Since their somewhat troubled season though 'encouraging' debut at Daytona in January, BimmerWorld Racing (BWR) has been prepping for the Sebring 120, aka Round Two of the IMSA Continental Tire Sportscar Challenge (CTSC). That race took place last month, but after press time for us, so our report – along with a preview of BWR's next race at COTA next month – will have to wait until the next issue. Small wonder we can hardly wait for the VIR race!



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Tech Day at Bimmer Performance Center

Well, this was originally billed as a great way to shake off the winter blues by getting out and drinking some coffee while huddling around a dyno for warmth. Instead, it turned into a stunningly beautiful early spring day, with the sun high and the temps heading north of 70! So much for being cold. This was a day to bring the

drop tops and the "M" cars for extended hops. Just about perfect.

Building on this meteorological marvel was the promise of a tech day with Dan Connor and team at the BPC. So many folks came out that we lost track of the attendees somewhere beyond 40

... perhaps well beyond. There were no surviving donuts or coffee, but no matter since the conversation was so engaging!

Dan provided a detailed explanation for a recent V-8 build for an M5. This included a deep discussion on how M-engines are different from the rest of the Bimmer line, how the twin-scroll

turbos work, and the design process for extracting max power. The dyno proved the point, with the M5 now spoiled up to more the 800-screaming horsepower. Yikes!

Meanwhile, out in the parking lot, we had an amazing array of Bavaria's finest spanning the years. The 1980's were well represented by a

"squadron" of E30's, including an original M3, from across the decade. The 90's were well represent by a batch of E36's ... and there E46's and a Z3 rounding out the early 21st century. We also had more recent M3's joining M4's and M5's ... and an M2 which had fewer than 300 miles on the clock

As the sun reaches its zenith for the day, it

was time to get onto other things for the day ... including lunch. It sounded like Woodstock for motorheads as all the Bimmers fired up and peeled off for the next venture for the day.

Once again, a big "thanks" to Dan and the Bimmer Performance Center team for a day that was enjoyed by all. **-Robert McIsaac**


