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CLUB RACING REPORT

Bad Brains Racing at Vir – A Recap

Greetings, fellow club racing fans!
When it comes to reporting on BMW CCA
Club Racing (CR) activities, this time of year can
be a real bummer, mainly because usually there's
nothing going on. And so far, the brand-new 2017
CR season has been running very much true to

For one thing, except for a couple of racing schools, the event calendar for this month and the next is about as bare as Mother Hubbard's you-know-what. What's more, the CR powers-that-be have so far kept mum about last season's class championship standings, meaning we can't say a whole lot about how local racers did on that score.

Of course, we could venture an unofficial guess that some members of our homegrown racing crowd – say, Tom Tice and Jack Wilkins in Spec E36, and April Curtis in D-Mod, to name a few – may have chalked up enough points to be regional contenders. But that would be no more than a shot in the dark, and we don't do that. Instead, we'll use this opportunity to fill in some gaps in our previous reports, starting with the story of Team Bad Brains Racing (BBR) at the Chump Car Eastern 'Chumpionship' event at VIR in December.

As previously reported, BBR was one of three local teams at the event; and came away with the best finish of the three. As far as we know, it was also the only local team made up entirely of BMW CCA members: Tarheel drivers Tom Tice, Jay Gold-

ing, Rich Abraham and John Gardner, plus Virginia club member Christian Shield, with Christopher Tice as crew. Here is the rest of their story, including all details we didn't report previously.

Originally billed as a 'Double-7' event, the race actually comprised two 8-hour stints, with all cars impounded on pit road after the Saturday stint to await the start of Part Two on Sunday. There were 75 cars to begin with, 30 of them including BBR in contention for the Eastern Region Chumpionship by virtue of having scored at least one Top Ten finish in 2016.

The race ran on VIR's North Course, which made for a really crowded field at the Saturday start. That, along with cool weather (cold tires?), resulted in a lot of double yellows as mechanical problems and some minor wrecks pared down the field to some 60 cars. But BBR's No.210 BMW ran strong and was solidly in 8th place at the end of the day Saturday.

The 8:00 a.m. restart Sunday saw more cool weather, followed by off-and-on rain. Having experienced faster-than-expected brake pad wear on Saturday, BBR chose to pit after one lap to change front pads, refuel and switch drivers, all of that in nine minutes (vs. a required minimum of 5 minutes for a refueling stop). By mid-day, BBR was running as high as 4th – until a five-minute stop-and-go penalty (for a "bit of side-to-side contact" according to Tice) set them back.

This delay was BBR's only lost time during the entire event. The team evidently regained a lot of

lost ground after that, for when the checker flew at 4:00 p.m. that afternoon, they were 8th overall and 5th in class. Having raced sixteen hours – and covered 1,100 miles in the process – against a "very competitive Chumpionship field", BBR's finish was clearly a solid testament to the capability and endurance shown by the No.210 car and its six drivers (not necessarily in that order).

As far as the NASA Racing scene goes, there is little we can add to our previous reports. The Mid-Atlantic Region's finale at Summit Point in November was apparently limited to Time Trials, with not a single local driver taking part. And the Southeast Region's season ender at Road Atlanta in December was likewise devoid of local participants, despite a huge Spec E30 contingent which usually includes at least a few local hot shoes but didn't this time around.

On the local pro front, BimmerWorld Racing (BWR) is back in the running for the gold in the Street Tuner (ST) class of the 2017 IMSA Continental Tire Sportscar Challenge (CTSC) series. As

previously reported, team owner and principal driver James Clay is once again entering two F30-based 328i's in the series. He will continue to pilot the No.84 car with co-driver Tyler Cooke. However, the No.81 car will be in the capable hands of team additions Greg Liefooghe and Ari Belogh, both of them transfers from Next Level European, BWR's now-inactive sister team.

As you read this, the first race in the series at Daytona has already run. But that was late last month and well after our filing deadline for this report, so look for our report in next month's issue. By then, BWR will be racing in Round Two, at Sebring, followed by Round Three at COTA in May, with our reports to follow. But if you feel like preempting our reportage, do what we like to do: Watch the action in real time as it streams on IMSA's website. Yeah, it's 2.5 hours long, but it's well worth the time.

Downshifting quickly, they took great care of us with strong coffee, excellent food and remarkably quick service. Afterward, it was time to kick tires in the lot ... which included a pair of Z3's and M4's, a trio of M3's, an R75/5 ... and a great collection of others. Probably set some sort of record for the number of Bimmers and Beemers concurrently in Bunn!

Once we wrapped up lunch it was time to head toward home, more or less. One approach would have been to head straight for the barn, but that would have been too quick. Nix that! So, after more than an hour of aimlessly exploring the wonders of county roads in the region, and tapping the power reserves on the Bimmer, there was only one logical thing to do. Stop for coffee!

Over a great brew (and homemade chocolate chip cookies) we swapped stories and solved a whole range of "serious" problems, including how best to set up an Amazon Fire-stick and the proper way to tour the Blue Ridge Parkway. By the time we were done at the cafe, the sun was fading and we were just about done planning a summer's worth of new adventures!

Touring Joara 2016

More than sixty automotive enthusiasts from all over the southeast met in Morganton for a tour of the North Carolina foothills and mountains on October 15, 2016, participated in the fifth annual Touring Joara. This event benefits the Exploring Joara Foundation, a nonprofit organization supporting public archaeology in the Catawba and Yadkin river valleys. The 100 mile Tour and Poker Run began at Catawba Meadows Park and Archeological Site in Morganton. There were three stops where participants picked up poker cards and were able to stretch their legs for a bit. The Touring ended at the Hook & Anchor Restaurant at 3:30 pm for a catered BBQ lunch.

The Tour started at Catawba Meadows Park

where we were able to inspect the continued construction of a new living history center, a major project for Exploring Joara Foundation. This project gave visitors a glimpse into the distant past of Burke County and North Carolina. Exploring Joara Foundation has raised \$150,000 to build two reproductions of Native American houses with a stockade fence and a garden so that you could see how the Native Americans were living in Burke County when Juan Pardo arrived here in 1567. This project is on going and will eventually include a museum to house artifacts and an archeology trail. This is a very exciting project that provides North Carolina with an important historical resource.

Touring Joara 2016 traveled through four counties on some of the most scenic and historic

roads in western North Carolina We drove on roads the Overmountain Men traveled 236 years ago on the way to The Battle of Kings Mountain, as well as Iuan Pardo's expedition into the interior reaching the Native American Town Joara in 1567. This year's tour included roads such as Fish Hatchery Rd ["The Worm"], Hwy-80 ["Devil's



Whip"], and again this year, except downhill, Hwy-226a ["Diamond Back"]. The Tour took us by various points of interest including The McDowell Houses. The Museum of North Carolina Minerals, and The Berry Site where the Native American Town Joara and Fort San Juan Archeological

Sites are located. The Tour provided stunning views of Lake James, Table Rock, Shortoff Mtn., Lake Tahoma, and Mount Mitchell, not to mention some of the best fall colors you can find anywhere

Touring Joara is a fundraiser for Exploring Joara Foundation. Exploring Joara Foundation is a nonprofit organi-

zation located in Morganton, NC that supports public archaeology in the western Piedmont region of North Carolina. Contributions from Touring Joara provide support for public and private


