This time around, given the cool temperatures, even the Beemer drivers came in Bimmers.

Once the museum opened and we made our way inside and were greeted by a stunning array of cars from the 1930s which truly defined rolling art. The exhibit, known as "Rolling Sculpture: Art Deco Cars", is at the North Carolina Museum

of Art in Raleigh until January 15, 2017. One of the amazing things about these vehicles is that they are remarkable to look at from any angle including, ironically, laying on the floor and looking at the undercarriages. It seemed that no expense was spared by the designers of these vehicles which represent very different philosophical approach is to the

basic problem of moving people and metal down the road. Even the exhaust systems on some of the French vehicles look like extended care had been given to making them look "just right".

It is also amazing to see how advanced some of the prewar technology really was. One car sported a straight eight engine and front wheel drive from 1930, a fascinating configuration which pre-dated broad use of front drivers by almost half a century. Several of the cars from the mid-1930s sported electromagnetic shifting mechanisms which, as nearest we could tell, would have been the SMG / DCT gear boxes of their day!

However, the other possible development – the rumored roadster version of the gorgeous i8 – seems to have more life to it. As a true-blue roadster fan, I'm really looking forward to welcoming its arrival. That is assuming BMW will let us have it Stateside. Of course, I probably won't be able to afford one, but it'll be nice to see it in the flesh as it were. Happy New Year!

The curator of the exhibit has done amazing job and for many this was not the first time had taken the tour. Nevertheless, by noon, the crew was hungry and it was time to saddle up and find some chow. That was easily accomplished with a 45 minute tour around Falls Lake which ultimately took us to Wake Forest and a restaurant called "Over the Falls". While there were some minor issues with getting a large group seated, by breaking up into groups of two or four we were able to

get in and settled remarkably quickly. For the future, restaurants that don't take reservations may represent a bit of a challenge!

Nevertheless, everyone had a great meal and a great time talking about all that we had seen as well as other events which are coming up at the museum. Several special events with the art deco cars in the

CLUB RACING REPORT

Eastern Chumpionship Rehash; Wilkins Shines at Roebling

Hello, fellow club racing fans, and welcome to 2017!

At this point in time, we're not going to engage in any prognostications. Doing so now is pretty futile because our official crystal ball just isn't up to it this early in the racing season. And filling this limited space with idle chatter about what we personally may think is going to happen would steal room we need to tell you about two important events that took place last month before the holidays – the 'Double 7 Chumpionship' race at VIR and the BMW CCA Club Racing (CR) 2016 Season finale at Roebling Road.

We consider these events to be biggies not only because they were season closers for their respective organizations but also – actually mainly – because between the two of them they brought the bulk of our local racing talent to the track.

The VIR event was staged by the eastern Chump Car crowd, which is as good a reason as any why it was labeled a 'Chumpionship' race. And the 'Double 7' part of the label meant the event would consist of two 7-hour races on Dec. 3 and 4. At least, that's what he program said. But as we've told you before, the Chump Car guys are – well, kinda flexible when it comes to rules. So, true to form, by the time race day rolled around, the event had morphed into a couple of back to back 8-hour stints. Or maybe not, but that's the best we can figure from the reports we got from

several of the participants.

Anyway, this made the race all the more challenging for the sixty-plus teams competing for the Chump Car gold, including the three (that we know of) in which local hot shoes played a big part: Teams Bad Brains, Red Rooster and No Panic. (Don't you just lo-o-ve those names?) But giving you the whole nine yards – the lap times, wrecks, off-course excursions and so forth – would make a very long story. So to make it nice, short and to the point, here's the nitty-gritty:

Bad Brains, with Tom Tice, Rich Abraham and a few others doing the piloting, did best. Despite the grueling pace which saw some fifteen teams drop out of the race, their car (the red No. 210 BMW shown on the front cover of last October's FOOTNOTES) held up well throughout the weekend. And apparently so did the drivers, as Bad Brains finished 'only' eleven laps down from the overall winner to place eighth.

The Red Rooster team had veteran club racer and body fixer par excellence Scott McDuffie join a brace of Porsche drivers in the No. 498 BMW (also visible on that front cover photo). They finished 15th, a whole 17 laps down. But as Scott later explained, that was par for the course. "Just about every finishing car was at least a lap down from the one in front of it," he said, adding: "Our car may not have been as good as the 210 car, but it did the job. Our problem was pit stops and maybe less experienced drivers."

Team No Panic may have had the most frustrating experience. With Mike Hinkley, Reg Williams, Russ Kimbro and two other drivers spelling each other behind the wheel, the No. 42 BMW raced hard and well, staying in contention through most of the race, despite literally running the rubber off its right side tires by early Sunday. But just fifteen minutes before the checker, "our trustworthy motor let a couple of rods out of the block," says Mike. (Bummer!) So No Panic ended up 23 laps down, though still credited with a finish in 17th place. Still, Mike feels that "a good time was had by all" – which is what really counts.

Given the Chump Car group's 'interesting' rules, these finishes may constitute a silver lining for the three teams, by sticking them with fewer lap 'penalties' for the races ahead than the teams that finished higher up. But then again, don't hold us to it; those rules may change again.

A week later, the CR finale at Roebling saw some three dozen cars and (probably) 40-plus drivers show up at the track. Predictably, about a third of the drivers were local hot shoes, and they put on a damn good show, pretty much dominating the seven-car Spec E36 contingent and giving an excellent account of themselves in several other classes during the three-race (two sprints and an enduro) weekend.

All in all, four Tarheel drivers chalked up ten class victories between them. They were led by John Wilkins, who won Spec E36 in all three races. Tom Tice finished second in all three, trailed by four more local Spec E36 pilots – Mark Fishero, Jeff Breiner, Phil Antoine and John Alemanni.

Dennis Pippy made his mark in I-Prepared (with eleven cars the biggest class at the event). He won the first sprint overall; finished second overall in the long race; and took third in class in the Sunday sprint. Fellow Tarheel and IP pilot Rich Zulman trailed far behind in the first sprint but moved up to finish fifth overall in the endure and 5th in class in the Sunday race.

Two other local hot shoes, Sanjeev Duggal (GTS3) and April Curtis (D-Mod) cruised to three solo wins each in their respective classes. Duggal's finishes were in the Top Ten overall in all



three races; while Curtis won the long race with Mike Hinkley as co-driver.

On the pro front, BimmerWorld Racing (BWR) owner/driver James Clay says that his plans for the 2017 IMSA Continental Tire Sportscar Challenge series will focus entirely on his two BMW F30-chassis-based entries in the Street Tuner (ST) class. To do so, he will not field the two Porsche Caymans of BWR's sister team, Next Level European (NLE) despite their fairly successful run last season. As a result, BWR's driver lineup will

consist of Clay and Tyler Cooke in the No. 84 328i, with Ari Belogh and Greg Liefooghe moving from NLE to step into the No. 81 328i.

As you read this, BWR is rarin' to get into the fray in the CTSC's first round at Daytona, the last weekend this month. Their next encounter after that is at Sebring in March. Of course, you'll be able to read about those races in this space. But if you want to get ahead of our reports, you can always go to the IMSA website and watch the action real time like we do.

Dinner Delights

With the sun setting earlier now it suddenly feels "late" at dinner time ... but that didn't deter the faithful in Raleigh on Tuesday, November 15! A terrific group across the Bayarian portfolio

arrived, numbering 23 people and 13 Bimmer's ... although one of them looked suspiciously like a Tesla! The cars ranged from an admitted 1985 E30 garage queen up to a Long Beach blue M2 that is so new that the break-in window has yet to be pierced. Lots of admiration for them and everything in between. A personal favorite of mine was a stunning

2001 M5 that looks like it just left the showroom.

Beyond the tire kicking and the admiration for test sits / rides in the Tesla, we had a chance to talk about upcoming events including the impending Charity Laps at VIR. The opportunity to perfect ones line through the Oak Tree Turn is always a welcomed pleasure!

Also had a chance to touch on the impending Open House at Leith BMW to celebrate the grand opening of the new facilities. Definitely worth the trip to see their new digs.

Dinner discussions ranged widely, touching on the virtues of electric cars, challenged with charging stations, trips to visit the hallowed ground at Nurburgring for some "test drives" and one of the best kept secrets in all of France (the National Auto Museum at Mulhouse). Somewhere in there dinner, in the form of actual food, did make an ap-

pearance ... just prior to it disappearing.

All too soon it was time to saddle up and head home. Something special hearing all those Bimmer's fire up and peel off into the dark of night ... ready for the new adventures that await around the next corner.. -Robert McIsaac






